#### Mateo Zoni

Mateo Zoni was born in Parma in 1979. In 2001 he directed *Fassbinder: dritto al cuore di Alexanderplatz*, a documentary feature produced and broadcasted by Rai-Sat Cinema. In 2004 he made *Rashomon o della verità*, a documentary about the staging of Ryūnosuke Akutagawa's Rashomon by a Portoguese farmers' theatre company commissioned by Centro Cultural de Belém. In 2011 he worked with Gianni Amelio on *The First Man*, a film adaptation of Albert Camus's unfinished book. The same year his documentary *Ulidi* 

baby of mine, produced by Indigo Film competed at 29 Torino Film Festival and was released in theaters the following year. It's the story about Paola, a girl living in a residential treatment center for teenagers far from her Moroccan mother and Italian father and their life in the Emilian countryside. After a long-suffering, she's forced to face the hardships of adolescence ending and adulthood beginning. In 2012 he also directed Elena, un giorno d'estate, a short film about a girl's mystical visions in a small province.

## Daniele Ciprì

Daniele Ciprì was born in Palermo in 1962. He and Franco Maresco worked on several feature films that are considered cult classics in Europe, including Lo zio di Brooklyn (The uncle from Brooklyn), Enzo, domani a Palermo!, Totò che visse due volte (Totò who lived twice). It was the Son, Ciprì's first solo directing project, was awarded the Golden Osella for best Photography at the 2012 Venice Film Festival. Money Buddies is his second feature film.
